

Dedication

This year's show is dedicated to Pauline Liengme, whom we lost this year. Pauline was a tour-de-force in the theatrical world in Angionish and lent her talents to the stage any chance she could. Pauline directed two shows for *Music of the Night* and brought her energy and passion to all she did.

Pauline grew up and lived half of her adult life in the UK. While there, she spent time in the Stamford Shakespeare Company based at Tolthorpe. Highlights were her performances of Mistress Quickly (*The Merry Wives of Windsor*) and Mistress Overdone (*Measure for Measure*). She moved to Canada in 1993 and immediately immersed herself into the theatre community.

She spent many happy years working in Theatre Antigonish under the guidance of Addy Doucette and had two seasons with Festival Antigonish. She met Pam Calabrese MacLean, and they formed Company Calabrese. Together they toured with MacLean's award-winning play Her Father's Barn to the international theatre festival Victoria BC and London ON. She won many awards for her acting and directing. She worked closely with students at StFX and members of CACL, and with Sister Lillian Gaudet and her music students to spread her love of performance. For ten years, her Harbour Players group performed at dinner-theater events fundraising for non-profit organizations. She was a very enthusiastic and committed volunteer and Pauline received formal recognition from both the Province and Antigonish County for her volunteer work. She was a founding member of the RK MacDonald nursing home foundation, a member of the friends of the RK, she served on the boards of Theatre Antigonish and Mulgrave Road Theatre company, she also worked with the St Martha's Regional Hospital Auxiliary and became President of the Nova Scotia Association of Health Auxiliaries for 2017-2018. In



2017 she fulfilled a lifelong ambition and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts from St FX. In her spiritual journey she became a member of the Parish of Three Harbours, worshiping at St Paul's where she became a Lay Minister and chair of the parish council.

Pauline directed two Music of the Night shows in 2000 and 2001. She was a huge supporter of local talent, students and her community at large. We dedicate our show to her memory and know that she leaves behind a theatrical legacy.

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Director's Note

Welcome all to Horace Green Preparatory School! I hope you're ready to rock out with us for the next few hours, folks! As I have reflected on in past shows, I am always particularly touched by the intergenerational exchange that occurs in our space, between our cast and crew. To see first-time actors share the stage with seasoned professionals, or the pit band comprised of a mixture of high school band players and adult professionals, the culture of organic mentorship and creative exchange that is harvested in this space is unique and exceptional. And I am lucky to have worked with Pauline on several projects. She held the torch of director for *Music of the Night* multiple times and our paths intersected over the years of being come-from-aways living in this town and pouring ourselves into the theatre community. Thank you, Pauline, for bringing so much passion, soul, and integrity to the stages of Antigonish.

On a personal note, I am blessed to be sharing this project with my long-standing collaborators, Brent and Helen. I feel proud of my stage

management team, Savannah and Pepijn, who continue to flourish and evolve in this intense environment. I also feel a sense of motherly pride to see youth actors that I have worked with for the bulk of their lives come to the end of their tenure as child actors, at the precipice of stepping into adulthood and all that it will bring. Thank you to the unstoppable one-man army that is Kris Hunter, and to Kim & Kathryn for the optical brilliance that are the costumes of this show. Finally, it has been soul food to share this show with my family - my daughters, my partner Greg, my niece, and my brother. I love you all deeply.

Musical Director's Note

Music of the Night, a concept that was developed in 1997, was originally planned as a creative outlet for the youth of the Antigonish community. The co-creators, Alan Edmonds and I felt that opportunities for youth to perform would be increased by an annual production. As we developed our first show, we realized that tickets sales could be channeled to the Dr. JH Gillis High School band program and boost the financial support for a very active and dedicated band program.

Finding music theatre repertoire that features youth-friendly topics can be challenging. Over the years, productions of *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat, Honk, Oliver: Elf: And Godspell,* were excellent shows that featured our young talent.

With our *School of Rock,* we have a "hit-it-out-of-the-park" show, with this amazing adaptation by Andrew Lloyd Webber, of the 2003 movie version featuring Jack Black as Dewey Finn.

Students will sing, play guitar, bass, drums, percussion, keyboards and horns on stage, and will be complemented and reinforced by our rockin' pit orchestra.

Lloyd Webber writes songs that capture the angst, insecurities, hopes, and aspirations of today's youth. Humorous but revealing insights into educational institutions and their teaching staffs round out the songbook.

In addition to this production, we have the added excitement of renaming our performance space, The Eleanor Mutimer Theatre, in honor of the amazing educator and theatrical giant ,who produced amazing theatre during her teaching career at the Regional.

Eleanor taught English, French, and Latin from 1972-1998, and after school she directed, inspired, trained, and coached her students in superb productions of Shakespeare, Moliere, Goldsmith, Wilde, and numerous Gilbert & Sullivan operettas. These productions rivalled any touring, professional productions and inspired many students to pursue a career in the fine arts.

Eleanor's legacy and commitment to the arts has, and will, continue to inspire generations of students, with this strong commitment to develop and upgrade this theatre space.

My gratitude and thanks goes out to our amazing cast, musicians, crew, volunteers, and our excellent creative team of Jenn Priddle, Helen Bannerman, Savanah Borden, Kim Bain, Kathryn Litke, Aaron Bannerman, Kris Hunter, Ryan MacKinnon, and Karen Clifton.

Sit back, get off your feet, and welcome to the *School of Rock*!





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Welcome to the newly named Eleanor Mutimer Theatre!

In recognition of her impact as a teacher, theatre director and inspiration to countless students, the Dr. John Hugh Gillis Regional High School will rename its audiovisual auditorium The Eleanor Mutimer Theatre.

A celebration of Mrs. Mutimer's many contributions will take place during Music of the Night's production of School of Rock, November 23-26, and November 29-December 1. This will include a gala and official naming ceremony to take place following the performance on Friday, November 24. Prior to each performance, former students and colleagues will share with the audience their gratitude and memories of Mrs. Mutimer. There will also be a display of photos, programs, and memorabilia from the numerous shows Mrs. Mutimer directed over the years.

"When we approached Eleanor about naming the theatre, she was, not surprisingly, reluctant," said Brent Bannerman, Music of the Night's musical director and Mrs. Mutimer's former colleague. "She felt (rightly so) that theatre at the Regional was the result of a team of people. But there is no escaping that Eleanor was the driving force and that her love of theatre and her attention to her students had a deep impact. Many of those students have gone on to have careers in the performing arts."

Eleanor Mutimer came to the regional high school in 1972 to teach French and Latin, soon adding Grade 11 and 12 English to her duties. Drama, as an extracurricular option, soon followed, with Mrs. Mutimer directing Twelfth Night in 1975-76. Over the next 25 years, she would oversee a team of teachers and students in producing one major production per year, including 14 full-length Shakespeare plays and four Gilbert & Sullivan operas under the musical direction of Brent Bannerman. In addition, she organized and supervised an annual play festival, with senior students directing one-act plays in each grade.

Mrs. Mutimer's final production was Jean Anouilh's The Lark in 1998, her



retirement year. Mrs. Mutimer returned to her native United Kingdom in 2000 where she and her husband Brian spent 10 years enjoying countless theatre performances across Great Britain and Europe. Sadly, Brian died of

Parkinson's disease in December of 2013. Mrs. Mutimer remains an active correspondence with friends, past colleagues and former students. We are so happy to be honouring Eleanor's legacy with here name on our theatre and we will keep theatre and music alive in Antigonish!

A Note From Eleanor Mutimer:

It is extremely difficult for me to express adequately what I am feeling at this moment. The high school's AV theatre has been important to me since 1972 when I began my career in the school; for close to 30 years, I felt honoured and privileged to be working in it. Now, I feel that you have bestowed that privilege and honour on me again as it will share my name. However, it is most important for me to mention that the theatre was not brought to life by one person, but by a wonderful group of colleagues and friends who worked together throughout those years, with commitment and in harmony. I hope that you will allow me to name them.

When Brent first mentioned this naming to me, I told him that it should be named The Bannerman Theatre. For most of our productions from the late seventies until I retired in 1998, Brent worked with me to compose or adapt incidental music which he, or a group of his musicians, performed under his direction. For our four full productions of Gilbert and Sullivan comic operas, he took on the responsibility of musical director, conducting a pit orchestra of his own young musicians. In addition, the theatre rang, three or four times a year, with incredible performances by his stage and concerts bands.

Then, how fortunate we were that Peter Rawding so willingly shared his talents with us, working with the casts, directing the members of the chorus, and performing memorable roles himself. We all remember his unforgettable Madame Arcati! The backstage work of mounting and running the productions was fulfilled year after year by the same wonderfully hardworking, enthusiastic team. With meagre resources, but supported always by Lauchie and Walter, who managed to produce a few precious dollars, Fred single-handedly designed and hung curtains to enclose the sets, and devised and constructed a lighting set-up which, by magic, transported the world into the theatre. Donna and Leona cut, sewed, and fitted costumes which brought the centuries to vivid life. Ancient Greek, Medieval, Tudor, Stewart, Victorian, to mention a few. Gerarda encouraged groups of hefty lads to discard their hobnailed boots in spite of the holes in their socks and partner a bevy of lovely girls in really breathtaking dances. Colin, Joe, Leo, Len, with their students, built remarkable sets which Mary's and Nancy's artistic talents filled with stunning life. I think there are few who could forget the impressive English Oak which Nancy and her students 'planted' centre stage, the bright gondolas they floated on the canals of Venice, the plum trees blossoming in Japan, the imposing medieval

courtroom in which Joan of Arc was tried, to name just a few. What about our wonderfully efficient business managers, Miriam, Linda, Judy, Mike, who organised the ticket sales, supervised the printing of programmes, "manned" the entrance, took care of the seating, welcomed the audiences, helped the students to get ready, looked after the publicity, made sure that the cast party was prepared and enjoyed by all, including our dear janitor, Nick.

Although several members of our team, Donna, Joe, Vaughn, Len, Duffy, Kathleen, Real, Bob, have sadly left us, the recollection of their dedicated contribution to our work, as well as their enthusiastic spirit, will always bring light to the theatre.

I really believe that this honour belongs to all of these special human beings.

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School of Rock - Did you know?

As a movie about a teacher who turned his class into a band, there are a ton of child actors in the movie *School of Rock*. One of them would end up skyrocketing to fame. Miranda Cosgrove made her acting debut as Summer Hathaway in the movie, and she became well known as the star of *iCarly*.

The musical School of Rock was nominated for four Tonys. The nominations were for Best Book of a Musical, Best Musical and two nominations for the Best Original Score (Music and/or Lyrics) Written for the Theater.

School of Rock is legendary composer Andrew Lloyd Webber's first musical to premiere on Broadway since 1971. This hit musical features 14 new songs as well as all of the original songs from the movie.



The latter is also the longest running show in Broadway history.



Congratulations to Music of the Night's Production of *School of Rock!*

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The Story of School of Rock

This musical is based on the comedy film *School of Rock* (2003). The plot followed struggling rock singer and guitarist Dewey Finn, who is kicked out of his band and subsequently disguises himself as a substitute teacher at a prestigious prep school. After witnessing the musical talent in his students, Dewey forms a band of students to attempt to win the upcoming Battle of the Bands.

In an April 2013 interview, Andrew Lloyd Webber first revealed that he had purchased the stage rights to Richard Linklater's film, and planned to make its adaptation into a musical his next project after completing the West End show *Stephen Ward*. The composer stated, "There may be songs for me in it, but it's obviously got songs in it as it stands," and that he would be going from *Stephen Ward*, "sort of a chamber musical, to a musical about kids playing the guitar." In May 2014, it was revealed that the show was likely to receive its world premiere on Broadway partly due to the fact that the American subject matter fitted Broadway. Webber also credits various locations of the original School of Rock that "produce the sort of kids required who can actually perform in the show," and that Britain would need similar schools for the show to move to London.

On the 18th of December, 2014, an official announcement was made of the musical, with a world premiere on Broadway set for Autumn 2015. This would be the first time since *Jesus Christ Superstar* in 1971 that a Lloyd Webber musical would premiere on Broadway rather than in London's West End. It would also mark a return for the composer to the Winter Garden Theatre, where his *Cats* ran for 18 years.

Speaking of his vision for the musical, Webber suggested that it would focus more on the stories of Dewey's young students than the film did, stating "It has to be a bit more rounded. I'd quite like to know more about the children and their parents." Speaking about music, he explained the need for additional music rather than simply using the film's full soundtrack: "You can't do heavy metal for hours and hours in the theatre – everyone would be screaming. So they have to be theatrical songs too. And we've obviously got to use the iconic songs from the original show. It would be a shame not to do a Stevie Nicks song." The script of *School of Rock* was written by *Downton Abbey* creator Julian Fellowes.
